Reporting of coronavirus	Upheld complaint about a front-page article which claimed that deaths from causes other than coronavirus had risen sharply during the previous six months.	Complaints about the coronavirus pandemic are being actively monitored. 	Two upheld complaints about claims made in opinion pieces.	
Reporting of suicide and deaths	Third-party complaints about potentially excessive details in two separate inquest reports about different people.	IPSO has published guidance for journalists on the reporting of suicide. Reporting of suicide is also incorporated into broader training for newsrooms on the Editors' Code of Practice.
	Third party complaints about publication of photographs of a man involved in an act of suicide.	
	Complaint about potentially excessive details in an online article about an individual in the US, ruled outside IPSO's remit for global jurisdictional reasons.	
	Complaint that a transgender person was misgendered in an inquest report.	
Privacy	During the investigation into a complaint about a potential breach of privacy which was not upheld, concerns were raised about the complaints handling protocol at the publication.	Complaints about a potential breach of privacy are actively monitored and concerns about complaints handling procedures addressed directly with the publications concerned.
