Privacy	Upheld complaint in which a woman's privacy was breached by the inclusion of an extract from a confidential report about her in the article.	Complaints about a potential breach of privacy are actively monitored.

	Three third parties concerned about a potential breach of privacy of a domestic abuse victim who was pictured.	
Transgender matters	Upheld complaint regarding the publication of inaccurate information about new NHS guidance.	IPSO's guidance for journalists and editors on the reporting of transgender people will be revised in 2022.
	Complaint about a comment piece made by multiple complainants was not upheld.	
	Third party complaint about the description of the gender of a defendant in a court report.	
Court reporting	Upheld complaint after a publication misrepresented a man's crime by misreading a press release.	IPSO's guidance for journalists and editors on court reporting will be published shortly.

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	Two upheld complaints when publications inaccurately reported that a defendant was a grandmother, which was not the case.	
	Upheld complaint after a publication reported a point made in a court case by the prosecution as a fact.	
Accuracy	Upheld complaint after a report conflated two people with the same name in an article about a local business.	These issues will be monitored to ensure that there are not consistent failures in such processes.
	Complaints about seven different publications inaccurately reporting a woman's profession were all resolved directly.
